

Lakes South of Vanderhoof

Tachick Lake

Located just 20 minutes south of town, Tachick Lake Resort offers great fishing for rainbow trout weighing up to eight pounds! The lake is also home to a large population of Cranes. Boat launch, Boat dock, Canoe and Boat rentals, Cabins, RV Park, and restaurant available. See Tachick Lake Resort brochure for details on rates.

Nulki Lake

Located 14km south of town, Nulki Lake is also great for rainbow trout fishing. Campsites, some with full hookups, and cabins available.

Home Lake

Forestry Recreation Site 36 has a small cabin located at the end of the Home Lake hike-in trail.

Finger Lake

Finger Lake offers excellent fishing for rainbow trout and many other types of fish. This lake is also great for wildlife watching. Located 70km south of Vanderhoof with two-wheel drive access, Finger Lake offers boat and motor, belly-boats, canoes, RV sites, and cabins available for rental. See brochure for more details.

Tatuk Lake

Trout and Kokanee may be caught in this lake. Sizes range from 2 pounds up to 11 pounds. Tatuk Lake is located 78 km down the Kluskus Forestry Road. See Tatuk Lake Resort brochure for information on camping and cabin rentals. Forestry Recreation Site 25 offers a small two-unit campsite at the west end of the lake.

Knewstubb Lake

This lake is great for fly fishing or trolling. Nechako Lodge is located near the west end of the lake by Kenny Dam. The lodge offers guests cabin rentals, camping, restaurant, canoe rentals, canoe guiding, aviation guide fishing, hiking, canoeing and photo-safaris. See the brochure for more details. Forestry Recreation Site 19 on the west end of the lake offers fishing, boating, and camping.

You must carry your licence while sport fishing and produce it for an official when asked.

Licences are available at government agents, sporting goods stores, and fishing lodges.

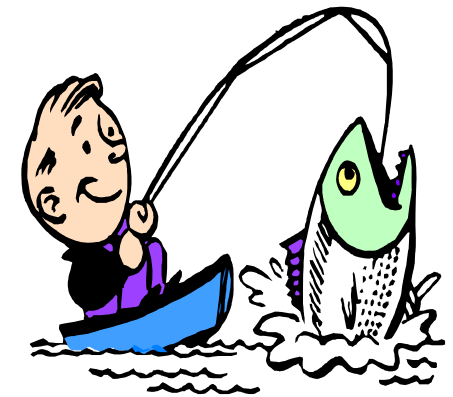

Lakes East of Vanderhoof

Cobb Lake

Forestry Recreation Site 33 offers tent camping, and canoeing. A small lake that has brook trout fishing all year around.

Graveyard Lake (Eulatazella)


Forestry Recreation Site 31, which offers camping, and a boat launch. Kokanee and small rainbow trout are available in Graveyard Lake.

Grizzly Lake

Forestry Recreation Site 29 has a car-top boat launch and camping. Grizzly Lake is great for rainbow trout fishing.

Hogsback Lake

Forestry Recreation Site 32 has a picnic area and camping. The lake is good for swimming and fishing.

Lakes West of Vanderhoof

Fraser Lake

Forestry Recreation Site 1 offers a boat launch and camping. A sandy beach leads to great swimming.

Ormond Lake and Oona Lake

Forestry Recreation Sites 3 and 4 are in a beautiful location with camping and boat launch facilities.

Peta Lake

Forestry Recreation Site 5 is a great canoeing lake with tent camping.

Top Lake

Forestry Recreation Site 6 is a small picnic, canoe and fishing site.

Hallett Lake

This is Forestry Recreation Site 14, which offers great views from this canoe and fishing lake.

Francois Lake

Forestry Recreation Sites 8 and 10 are very scenic, and offer great picnic areas. See Glenannan Tourist Area brochure for information about the numerous resorts of the area.

Lakes North of Vanderhoof

Fish Lake

Forestry Recreation Site 34 offers a car-top boat launch and tent camping. This small lake is a good trout fishing lake.

Echo Lake

Forestry Recreation Site 2 is a small-secluded lake that has tent camping. Caution, the road into the lake is rough and narrow.

Stuart Lake

Stuart Lake has two provincial campsites located on its southwest shore. Paarens Beach and Sowchea Bay are great places to camp while experiencing the Fort St. James area.
